

Buy a real NZ White Ribbon T-shirt!

Get on the kaupapa and look good. The new White Ribbon Day t-shirt is a great way to promote the message of **men against violence towards women** in a real kiwi way.

The awesome design is by Lee Watt, from the Hawkes Bay tribes of Rongomaiwahine and Ngati Kahungunu.

Lee has a carving background, is a design graduate of Massey University and is represented in the national museum, Te Papa.

The white ribbon, on the front of the shirt, has two Maori designs. The first pattern *rauru* (spiral) symbolises change. The second pattern *unaunahi* (the repeated three crescent shapes) depicts protection.

The main pattern on the back is *mangopare* symbolising masculinity. Within the mangopare, *unaunahi* is repeated with *porotiti* (the pointed peaks), a symbol of healing.



The words *All men are part of the solution* came from one of the presenters at a National Network of Stopping Violence Services workshop. Dr Michael Flood says some men are part of the problem but all men are part of the solution.

Whakarerekehia means "Make the change"!
